Celebration of 100 Years of Rotary in Hamilton

Past President Alex Moroz chairs our 100th Anniversary Committee which is well underway. The 100th Gala will take place on November 2nd, 2013 at Liuna Station in Hamilton. Our Board is committed to a fundraising goal of \$100,000.00 over and above our regular fundraising goals to be used for Literacy projects in Hamilton and internationally and to help build our "Rotary Forever Fund" which we maintain at the Hamilton Community Foundation.

Complete and fulfill our Club Visioning Process

With the assistance of Nan Bruce and others from District 7090, our club initiated a formal "Club Visioning" exercise in June, 2012 under the leadership of President-elect Chris Cutler who has completed the Rotary Leadership training and participates as a Rotary educator at the District level. We are engaging all of our membership in this process which will result in a plan being presented for Board approval by the end of 2012.

Increase and Engage Membership

Our Club has succeeded in increasing membership in the last twelve months. The momentum in this area has continued into this fiscal year. The leadership of the Club is committed to engaging new members through fellowship and opportunities to serve in Club activities. For example, on August 16th, 2012 new members who have joined the Club in the past year were invited to a summer barbeque, attended by 35 people, to meet and establish communication with Club leaders. The club recognizes the importance of diversity of its membership and is succeeding in that respect.

Meet our Club's Fund Raising Goals

The club will focus on our three major fund raising events during this Rotary year. The first event will be our annual campaign for our "Sunshine Fund" a goal of receiving a charitable gift from every Rotarian in our Club. Last year we surpassed our goal of \$15,000 for this campaign. This year, the Campaign target is to raise \$19,000.00 by September 25th, 2012.

Rotary Summer Literacy Program

Books, Books and more Books!

The Rotary Summer Literacy Program operates three twoweek sessions. This free program is offered to young people across Hamilton with a focus on youth at risk. Children attend the program to have fun during the summer months-no more teacher, no more books...not the case here. The fun activities promote and encourage reading and the love for learning. Over 350 children attend the program daily and many will maintain their literacy level over the summer holidays when many children's level regress. There is a lot of fun and laughter that happens, but there is also a lot of learning.

The Rotary Summer Literacy Program has been visited each day by one of our club members. The Rotarian of the Day program engages our Rotarians to visit the Rotary Summer Literacy program and to see first hand how the program operates and the value of the program.

The Rotarian of the Day greets the children and their parents, then joins the campfire song session and storey read out loud. The response has been great! The parents meet the Rotarians, the young people get to meet positive role models and Rotarians can see first-hand what their Sunshine Fund Donations help support.

Rotarians who helped out by being Rotarians of the Day at the Rotary Summer Literacy Program! The past 6 weeks have been very busy ones at the program. Each morning over 200 children were greeted by a Rotarian or two, the proceeded to the gym for the morning welcome and read along with the Rotarian of the Day!

The Rotary Summer Literacy Coordinator Rob Blunsdon did an amazing job again with the staff and over 2000 young people attending the program. In addition to the program staff, the Rotary Summer Literacy program partnered with the Hamilton Wentworth District School Board in working with over 50 `Focus on Youth employees. We also had a leadership development program called `Leaders in Training`.

Members' Appeal. This is a chance for each and every Rotarian in our club to personally give to the many great causes that our Rotary Club supports. As we celebrate the unofficial end of summer and children go

back to school, we at Rotary prepare to support nutritional snack programs and free after school homework help for students in some of the most neediest schools. These projects are only possible because we all support the Sunshine Fund.

The goal for the Sunshine Fund Appeal is to have 100% of our membership participate and to raise \$19,000. The personal support of the Sunshine Fund helps our club support the many projects and initiatives, such as the scholarships at Mohawk and McMaster, it helped introduce the International Tattoo to over 500 children and helps over 2000 children participate at a free after school program in the Wever Hub.

Our two remaining events, Spring Uncorked and Golf and Glamour are being scheduled for the Spring of 2013. Our plans are to raise the community's awareness of each event, each Rotarian's role in the event and build upon corporate sponsorship. Active and experienced Committees are working on these two projects now.

The funds raised from these projects and campaign will be used, in part, to continue our club's commitment to Literacy in Hamilton and for our International Projects and to help build our Rotary Forever Fund.

Our Club has developed a fundraising plan for the 100th Anniversary Fund.

Our Club recognizes that we must improve our contribution from members to the annual fund of The Rotary Foundation and the Board will continue to focus the attention of the membership on this important fund.

Continue to develop our local and international projects focusing on literacy and health

The focus in this area continues as described by our Club to the District Governor last year. The Club's primary area of work in the City of Hamilton relates to the provision of needed programs and services in Hamilton's north end. This area, identified as the fourth most impoverished neighborhood in Canada, has seen Rotary

take a leadership role in building "local" community supports in a variety of school communities.

Again, this year, Rotary will continue its major investment in literacy. Partnering with Cathy Wever School, the City of Hamilton and Board of Education, Rotary delivers summer literacy programs to thousands of local school children. Support for community based initiatives continue throughout the school year and involve such activities as Park Clean Up, Christmas Party, Community Based Youth Workers, Community Based Youth Programmers and Rotary Reading Partners. Internationally, the Hamilton Rotary club has a strong history of balancing

local work with International Development needs. This work will continue increasing the Club's awareness of our work around the world especially in Mali which is a priority.

As a final note, under previous presidents the Club's administrative and financial reporting systems have been reviewed, consolidated and updated. Financial management systems developed by our Treasurer Mike Yamamoto have been implemented by the Board. These systems are being continued to ensure continuity and sound management into the future years.
