The Forever Fund supports club projects at home and abroad

In a throw-away society where almost everything is disposable, the idea of something lasting forever is a compelling concept. That's the strength behind our club's Forever Fund – a permanent endowment fund that will help our community forever.

Invested on our behalf through Hamilton Community Foundation, the Forever Fund now stands at \$79,000. In the last two years, more than \$12,000 from income earned on the fund has been distributed to our club's projects both at home and abroad.

In time, we hope to grow the fund to the point where income earned is the equivalent of having a major fundraiser. Just think – money to spend on our charitable initiatives and no work involved!

Our club members have the opportunity to help the fund grow in two ways: by making current donations (many use it as a destination for "in memoriam" giving) and by promising a gift through their estate. Thirty-eight of our current or former club members have made that promise, and are known as members of the Broadfoot Circle. We have received one bequest, through the estate of John Shea.

The second annual Broadfoot Circle Recognition Evening was held at Hamilton Club recently, with Julie Shea, Randy MacDonald and Peter Quaglia inducted as new members of the Broadfoot Circle.




